



## Accessibility of Tracks ▶

Views from the hills are part of the Dunedin Botanic Garden's charm but check the colour-coded track guide before setting out.

Track surfaces range from asphalt to packed gravel, loose gravel and woodchip. Gradient and camber also vary. The track ratings are an average only. When choosing a route, use your own judgment.

Guide dogs are the only dogs allowed in the garden. Toilets and car parks are accessible and the inside of the Winter Garden Glasshouse.

You can catch an 'Opoho' bus up the hill, from the corner of Opoho Road and Great King Street.

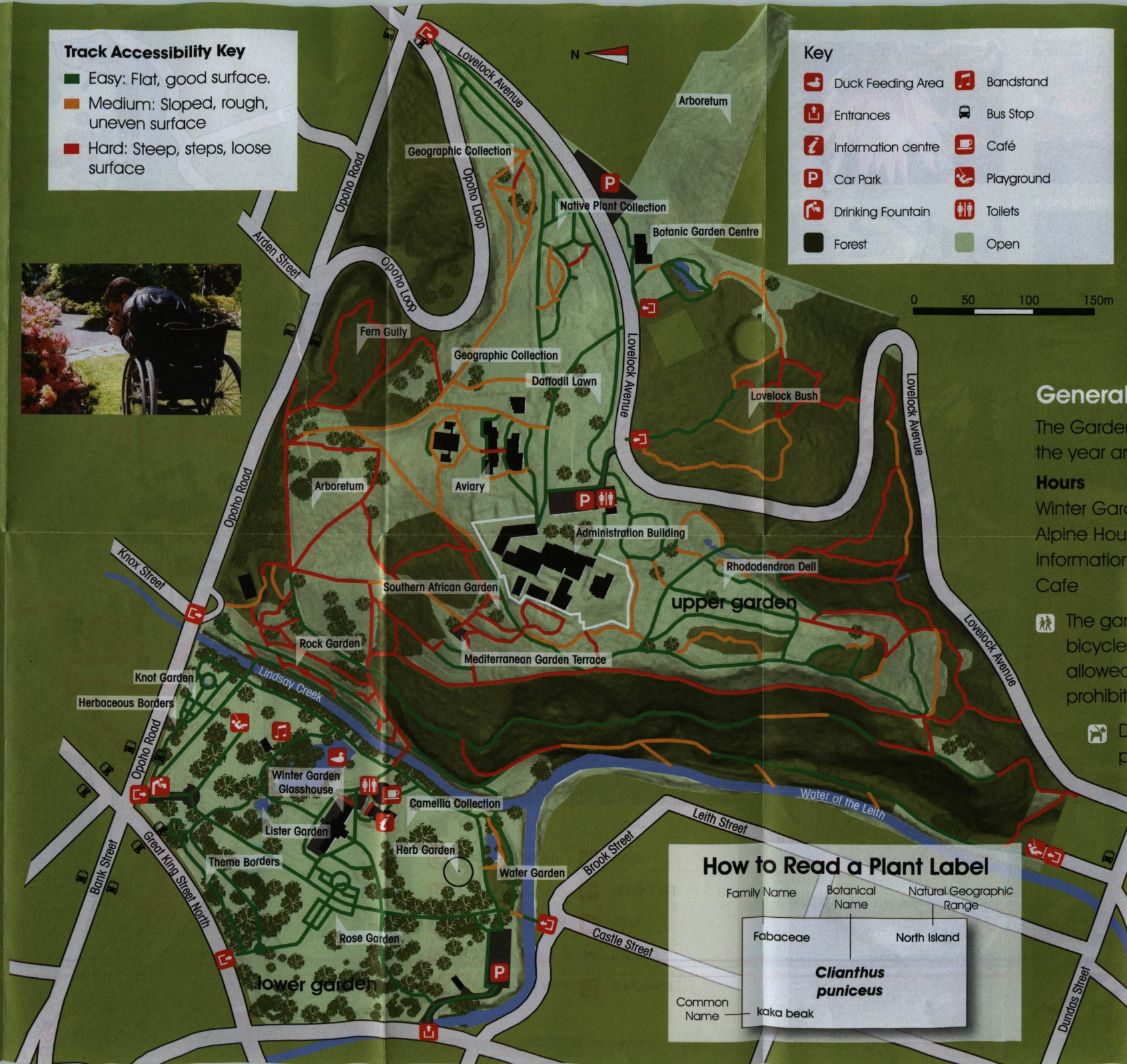

# Dunedin Botanic Garden Routes

Wander through the flat lower garden with its glossy camellias, perfumed roses and specimen trees. Follow the hill paths to explore the more secluded nooks and crannies of the upper garden, or visit the busy aviary. It takes about 15 minutes to walk up the hill to the upper garden.

## One minute's walk from the information centre

Just a minute away from the information centre you can choose from a playground or glasshouse, herb garden or duck pond, amongst others. Follow the route marked on the map for a longer circuit.

## A few minutes from the information centre

The flat lower garden is fully accessible – see the reverse for details. You can reach any one of the plant collections in just a few minutes from the information centre.

## Travel around the world in one hour

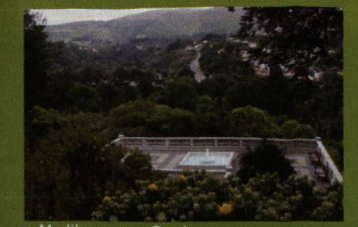
See parrots from Australia and New Zealand in the aviary. The Geographic Plant Collection and arboretum display wild plant species from every continent except Antarctica. This circuit includes an unmarked route through the grassy arboretum and a woodchip track through the bush of Fern Gully.

## New Zealand return in one hour

As you travel up the slope you'll visit two of the Garden's newest developments – the Mediterranean Garden and the Cedars of Lebanon Grove. Skim the edge of the Rhododendron Dell, then see the unique plants that evolved in New Zealand, displayed in the hilltop Native Plant Collection.

## Cultivated beds and wild woodland in one hour

The Rhododendron Dell sits on the toe of a hill surrounded by native forest. In spring it's ablaze with beautiful blooms. But you can enjoy this woodland garden in a naturalistic New Zealand bush setting at any time of year.

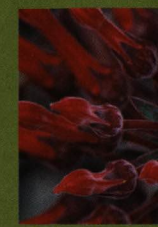

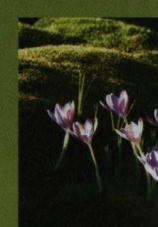
